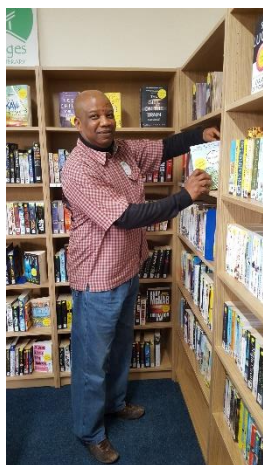

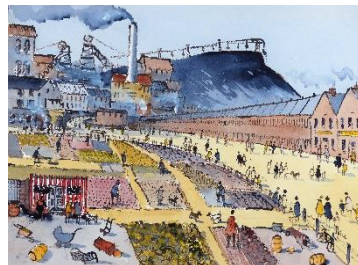

### 20 March at 7.30pm: "A History of South Yorkshire Mining Villages" with Mel Jones

Between the late eighteenth century and the 1930s South Yorkshire's rural landscape and communities were transformed by coal mining and the movement of coal, with the population growing at a phenomenal rate. Drawing on a wide variety of sources, Mel's copiously illustrated talk explores the history of the physical and social development of these very varied mining communities.



### 17 April at 7.30pm: "The state of nature in Sheffield" (and looking for otters on the River Don) with Nicky Rivers

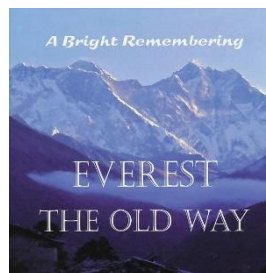


Dr Nicky Rivers, Living Landscape Development Manager at the Sheffield and Rotherham Wildlife Trust will be talking about the 'State of

### 15 May at 7.30pm: "Everest the Old Way" with John Driskell

In 1967 John and four friends saved up to buy a second-hand Land Rover in which they drove from Sheffield to Kathmandu. From there they made the 300-mile trek over high mountain ridges to Everest Base Camp. Returning to Nepal as old men in 2011 they revisited some of the places. Learn what motivated them, what they experienced over 50 years ago and reflections after their revisit.



### 12 June at 7.30pm: "A Feast of Folk"

## Friday 3 April at 7.30pm: Red Joan (Cert PG)



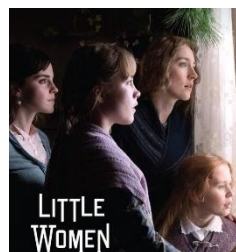
Loosely inspired by a true story, this dramatized biopic shifts between two eras as it recounts the tale of Joan Stanley, a longtime British spy for the KGB who sees her peaceful suburban retirement abruptly shattered when she's arrested for treason. Starring Judi Dench as the present day Joan and Sophie Cookson as her younger self.

## Friday 1 May at 7.30pm: Judy (Cert 12A)



The Judy Garland biopic, *Judy*, is being shown in May. Starring Renée Zellweger, Finn Wittrock, Rufus Sewell and Michael Gambon the movie is based on *End Of The Rainbow* by Peter Quilter. Legendary performer Judy Garland (Renée Zellweger) arrives in London in the winter of 1968 to perform a series of sold-out concerts. Zellweger was nominated for an Oscar for Best Actress.

## Friday 5 June at 7.30pm: Little Women (Cert U)



In June we bring you the latest film from the award winning director Greta Gerwig. The adaptation of Louisa May Alcott's *Little Women* stars Saoirse Ronan, Emma Watson, Florence Pugh and Laura Dern. In the movie Jo March reflects back and forth on her life, telling the beloved story of the March sisters - four young women each determined to live life on their own terms.

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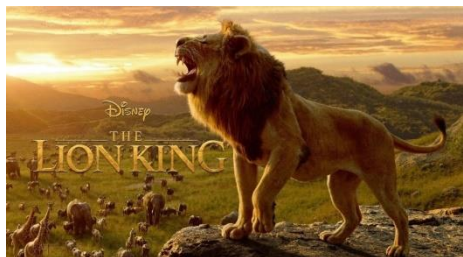

## Children's Cinema

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**Saturday 7 March at 2.30pm: Lion King (Cert U)**



For March we're showing the stunning photorealistic remake of the Lion King, directed by Jon Favreau (Iron Man, Jungle Book). After the murder of his father, a young lion prince flees his kingdom only to learn the true meaning of responsibility and bravery.

**Saturday 11 April at 2.30pm: Dora and the Lost City of Gold (Cert U)**

**Saturday 6 June at 2.30pm: Frozen 2 (Cert U)**



The most anticipated sequel is being shown in June with Frozen II featuring the voices of Kristen Bell, Idina Menzel, Josh Gad and Jonathan Groff. Anna, Elsa, Kristoff, Olaf and Sven leave Arendelle to travel to the ancient, autumn-bound forest of an enchanted land. They set out to find the origin of Elsa's powers in order to save their kingdom.

## Book Review

**“Where the Crawdads Sing” by Delia Owens**

Having family members living in the Carolinas in North America, I was drawn to this story of a girl growing up in the distinctive marsh area of North Carolina, known as the “Outer Banks”, in the 1970s.

Kya, six years old, is abandoned in a shack by her family because of her father’s abusive behaviour. Shunned by the nearby townspeople as “Marsh Girl”, she is left to survive by instinct. After a while a local boy looks out for her and teaches her to read, recognising her special gifts.

Her education and intelligence come from being in tune with the amazing natural surroundings. The book contains some beautiful descriptions of the area, as well as being a heart-breaking story of Kya’s coming of age, as abandonment and betrayal force her to become self-reliant but with a longing for love.

Interwoven in the story is a surprising murder which threatens Kya’s way of life. The haunting tale gives insights into a special setting and the triumph of human survival.
