The Greenhill Events Group

Have you ever wondered who masterinded the fabulous Christmas celebration around Greenhill in December and the even more amazing jubilee party across the entire village at the beginning of June? Meet the Greenhill Events Group: Deborah, Lisa, Joy and Rachel, four young mums with a magic combination of ideas, energy, and a passion for bringing the community together. Also part of the team but not pictured is Marie who has taken a step back but still brings her creativity to help out.



Group member Joy explains "Originally we wanted to do something that would tempt people back into the community postpandemic, something that brought together all aspects of Greenhill -- the churches, the library and the local businesses, something that would appeal to all ages and encourage volunteering." The Christmas event also raised £5,000 of which £2,000 came to the library and £2,000 to Greenhill School.

The group formally became part of the Friends of Greenhill Library in March, a move that put them on a firmer footing as an organisation, has allowed them to apply for funding (they were awarded over £5,000 from the National Lottery and elsewhere towards the jubilee event) and has simplified financial management. Library trustee Chris Brown commented "It is wonderful to have this massive injection of enthusiasm and imagination into the events team at the library. Once they've recovered from the Jubilee, we're super-excited to see what future events we'll collaborate on"

Evening Cinema

Friday 1 July at 7.30pm: Cabaret (Cert 15)



In July comes this musical celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. In the film, directed by stage legend Bob Fosse, a female club entertainer in Weimar Republic era Berlin romances two men while the Nazi Party rises to power around them. The film stars Liza Minnelli, Michael York and Joel Grey. Cabaret holds the record for most Oscars for a film not honoured by Best Picture.

Friday 29 July at 7.30pm: Belfast (Cert 12)



Kenneth Branagh's recent movie based on his childhood is our offering for August. In the movie a young boy and his working-class Belfast family experience the tumultuous late 1960s The movie stars Jude Hill, Caitríona Balfe, Jamie Dornan, Judi Dench and Ciarán Hinds. The movie won Outstanding British Film at this year's BAFTAs.

Friday 2 September at 7.30pm: West Side Story (Cert 12)



The recent remake of the classic Bernstein and Sondheim musical. In 1957 against the backdrop of the decaying tenements in the San Juan Hill neighbourhood, the constant threat of the wrecking ball and two warring gangs, an unexpected whirlwind romance begins. The film from Spielberg, his first musical, stars Ansel Elgort, Rachel Zegler and Ariana DeBose.

Friday 7 October at 7.30pm: Phantom of the Open (Cert 12)



This "always watchable" film has an "easy going appeal" according to empire magazine. Maurice Flitcroft, a dreamer and unrelenting optimist, managed to gain entry to The British Open Golf Championship Qualifying in 1976 and subsequently shot the worst round in Open history, becoming a folk hero in the process. Mark Rylance and Sally Hawkins star, Craig Roberts directs.

Children's Cinema

Saturday 2 July at 2.30pm: Encanto (Cert U)



The summer welcomes last year's Disney movie Encanto. In the movie, Mirabel is part of an extraordinary family who live hidden in the mountains of Colombia in a charmed place called the Encanto. Mirabel is the only one without magic. However, she soon may be the Encanto's last hope when she discovers that the magic is now in danger.

Saturday 3 September at 2.30pm: ET the Extra Terrestrial (Cert U)



September welcomes Steven Spielberg's classic 1982 family adventure. After a gentle alien becomes stranded on Earth, he's befriended by a young boy named Elliott. Bringing the extraterrestrial into his suburban California house, Elliott introduces E.T., to his brother and his little sister. Soon, however, E.T. falls ill, resulting in government intervention and a dire situation for both Elliott and the alien.

Saturday 8 October at 2.30pm: Ron's Gone Wrong (Cert PG)



In October we're showing Twentieth Century Studios and Locksmith Animation's Ron's Gone Wrong. It's the story of Barney, a socially awkward middle-schooler and Ron, his new walking, talking, digitally-connected device. Ron's hilarious malfunctions set against the backdrop of the social media age, launch them into an action-packed journey in which boy and robot come to terms with the wonderful messiness of true friendship.

The service is free; to register you just need your library card number and PIN. If you don't have these, please get in touch. Book Review: "On Green Dolphin Street" By Sebastian Faulks.



What books do our volunteers enjoy? Ann Firth reviews a recent read.

I was attracted to this book by the enigmatic title and by Faulks' reputation as a writer. The story is set in 1959 and involves three main characters: Mary, Charlie and Frank. Charlie is a diplomat working at the British Embassy in Washington and Mary is his wife. Their lives involve a great deal of socialising, parties and drinking. At one such gathering Mary meets journalist Frank and their mutual attraction leads to an affair.

The characters' purposes and motivation are explored through flashbacks to their earlier lives, by means of which we learn, variously, about the Vietnam war, the fear of Communism in the USA, the McCarthy witch hunts and life in middle-class post-war England. I found these chapters especially enlightening and entertaining. Part of the story takes place against the backdrop of the presidential election which brought John F. Kennedy to power, another part takes place in bleak communist Russia – two contrasting scenarios I found intriguing and educational. The story is, however, overwhelmingly about love in its various guises: passionate romance, dutiful caring, parental and familial. I thoroughly enjoyed following the characters through the plot and did actually care what happened to them – a good sign I feel! I was also grateful to the author for the opportunity to learn about a period of history of which I had previously known little. A recommended read.

We're pleased to report a big improvement in community engagement at Lowedges, largely thanks to a vigorous new events program. We have four weekly activities, all staffed by DBS checked volunteers, which will continue in the summer holidays:

• Mondays at 9am: Parents' Breakfast Club. Come for breakfast after dropping your children at school. Bring your little ones.
