Getting better all the time! Three new initiatives to improve our service



The library is excited to announce that we have some "new build" work starting in December. The most visible part will be the incorporation of the two exterior square areas in the children's library as interior spaces. The one on the right will extend the baby book area and the one on the left will be used for storage.

Less visible is the work planned for the back corridor – a refit of the kitchen, adaptation of the first toilet as an "accessible" facility, and splitting the second toilet into two smaller unisex units. Exterior work will start in December and interior work (which will undoubtedly be more disruptive) in January. However, we do not anticipate having to close the library completely during this work.

Have you requested a newly-released council library book only to find you're at the end of a long queue of reservations? Don't despair ... let us know and if we can we'll buy our own copy of the book and add it to our yellow sticker system. You should have it in your hands within a week!

Christine Ashdown

Christine started her professional life in Germany where she worked for 5 years in the Womens Royal Army Corps Royal Signals. Returning to the UK she worked in the Civil Service for 35 years during which she did 30 different jobs ranging from front-line at a job centre to a H&S factory assessor. "Apart from having a hard hat and a clipboard", she admits, "I had no qualifications for this at all".

She retired in 2020 after the first covid lockdown, having decided that a lifetime spent working alone at a dining table was not for her.

"I was aware there were opportunities at the library", she said. "You can't overestimate the value of these libraries and I feel a sense of pride to be able to contribute to the community."

Christine has helped on a variety of things, from selling Open Gardens tickets to litter picks, but her regular monthly contribution is in running the children's cinema events.

Book Review: "Stranger in the House" by Julie Summers



What books do our volunteers enjoy? Julia Greenwood reviews a recent read.

After the Second World War, over four million British Servicemen came home. While they were away much changed for the servicemen, mentally and physically, and the women left behind had become more independent taking care of the home and family. Neither the women nor men knew what to expect on their return home after being apart for many years. This book focuses on the experiences of the women: mothers, wives, fiancées, widows, daughters and grandchildren, during and after the war.

Letters from home were a lifeline for the servicemen and "brought untold comfort and reassurance to the men in the field". One chapter explains the postal operation and how correspondence reached the battlefields, the jungle of Burma and the Far East POW's. It tells of when men in a brutal Far East POW camp had been waiting for months for letters from home only to be made to watch 3 sacks of letters being burnt in front of them as a punishment for prisoners trying to escape.

Julie Summers' research brings together many stories, in a compassionate way, through the letters, diaries, photos and discovered documents, of experiences of women. Each chapter features stories, defined by the woman's relationship with the serviceman, some happy and some heart wrenching. It is an enlightening, interesting and factual account. I found the book fascinating and informative about an aspect of WWII which is rarely portrayed.
