Blowing our own trumpet

Since volunteers took over the library in 2014 we have:

- Organised 40 community-wide events
- Hosted 4,700 group meetings
- Raised £250,000 in funding
- Invested £133,000 back into library delivery
- Loaned out 178,000 books
- Found new homes for 53,000 books through our bookshop
- Had 400,000 library visits
- Benefitted from over 130 volunteers giving 41,000 hours

Featured Volunteer

Tessa Bainbridge



By her own admission, Tessa is a bit of a Jack-of-all trades, having worked in hospitality, tourism, marketing, communications, and (as a qualified personal trainer) in gyms and leisure centres. She holds a degree in hospitality and tourism management and her most recent job was as head of academics for a tourism college, before leaving to be a stay-at-home mum for her two children Henry (3) and Ruby (5). They moved to Greenhill towards the end of Covid restrictions.

"We used to come to the library", she explained, "and meet Wendy at the door each week to change our library books for the children. This was instrumental in us feeling at home in Greenhill and the kids finding somewhere to be." When the library reopened she started bringing the children to story time, and after our story-tellers Laura and Janet left, she volunteered to be part of the team that now runs the story time mornings. "It was a fairly seamless transition from bringing my kids to story time to actually helping to run the sessions" she says. She has subsequently started working with our craft club, and more recently in setting up a running group which has had a great initial take-up.

Asked what she gets out of volunteering, Tessa said "The library provides us with community contacts, especially for the kids to interact with a range of people of different ages and backgrounds. And the events ... like the Narnia readathon and the trip to the Lord Mayor's parlour. These are things that we otherwise wouldn't have opportunity to do."

We're thankful for the contribution of young mums like Tessa; it's such an important part of maintaining the vibrancy and continuity of life in our library.

Baffled, Pádraic persists in trying to make amends, but the row escalates.

Cert 15: Racism, strong language, sex) Sam Mendes latest movie is based loosely on his childhood. Olivia Colman plays a cinema manager struggling with her mental health, and Micheal Ward is a new employee longing to escape the provincial town where he faces daily adversity. Together they experience the healing power of music, cinema, and community.

It's the story of an extraordinary girl who, armed with a sharp mind and a vivid imagination, dares to take a stand to change her story.

Book Review: The Book of Stolen Dreams by David Farr. Reviewed by Isabelle.



The book tells the story of two children, Robert and Rachel out to save the world. The children live in a town controlled by a mean, elderly president called Charles Malstain. He makes the town a horrible place to live. One day their Dad shows them the book of stolen dreams which is kept in a special room in their local library where he works. This book has the power to open the gates for the dead to come back to life, so it could keep the mean president alive and in charge of the town forever. When their Dad is taken by the police it becomes the children's duty to keep the book safe and out of the hands of the president. The book follows their adventure

to save the world and includes dreams, escapes and risky journeys. I would definitely recommend it for children who like mystery and adventure aged around 9-11 years.
